





Children's Fund

Poverty is the most handicapping condition a child faces. Needs are often unmet due to their family's limited resources for food and shelter. For over 25 years, the NC Foundation for Public School Children has systematically delivered a fast and efficient program so children's needs can be met and the children can be in school and focus on learning.

The system is simple. Public school personnel identify needs, and the Foundation responds to requests within 24-48 hours. Teachers and support personnel are not burdened by paperwork in order to get help for their students. Whether it is eyeglasses, eye exams, hearing aids, dental help, orthotics, medications, medical and mental services, band instruments, reading books, school supplies, clean clothing and shoes that fit, or emergency temporary shelter, the Foundation comes through for kids.

Here are a few of our Children's Fund stories with only the names changed:

First grader Caleb's glasses broke. While his mom works at Waffle House and his dad at Walmart, they still live below the poverty line. It is all they can do to keep food on the table and pay utilities so coming up with money for eyeglasses was just not possible.

Caleb's mom tried gluing the eyeglasses back together, wrapping rubber bands around them, and taping them; but finally, they fell apart. Because Medicaid won't help with a new pair more than once in a six-month period, Caleb was without what he needed to see and succeed at school. Caleb's school social worker sent a request to the Foundation asking for help. Just one week later, Caleb was sitting happy and proud in his first grade classroom wearing his brand-new eyeglasses

Jasmine is in 6th grade. After a year of being in transition, Jasmine's mother finally found permanent housing and a little stability. Mom works hard to provide for her three children but cannot afford any extras. The school social worker helps the family by delivering orders from the school-based food pantry twice a week.

Jasmine loves music and was excited that, now in middle school, she would be able to enroll in band class, but Jasmine sat in her band class without an instrument to play. Jasmine was ashamed and, once again, was reminded that she was different from most of her classmates. Jasmine's mom could not afford to rent, much less buy, an instrument. Jasmine's favorite instrument is a clarinet. When her school social worker found out, she searched for help and found this Foundation. Now, Jasmine has her very own clarinet. The social worker sent a message to us that we would not believe how Jasmine's eyes lit up when she saw the shiny, new clarinet and found out it would be hers to keep.

Little third-grader Kayla recently enrolled in school. The school's Data Manager was reviewing her records and discovered Kayla did not have a current health assessment on file. North Carolina law requires students to have a current health assessment to be in school. Kayla's mom was given 30 days to obtain the assessment and, if one was not received, Kayla would be suspended until one was completed. Unfortunately, Kayla does not have health insurance. Her mom has been out of work for almost a month now and, as a single mom, she is struggling to make ends meet.

Kayla's school social worker contacted the local health department and was told there was not a physician on staff at this time and would be unable to provide medical services to the community until further notice. The social worker then contacted two local medical clinics who provide services on a sliding fee scale, but neither clinic was able to schedule an appointment for Kayla for 2-3 months.

Kayla was at risk of being suspended, and she needed to be in school. The social worker learned that CVS Drugstore can complete a health assessment within a week for \$105. Thanks to this Foundation, Kayla did not have to sit at home, suspended for months, waiting for a health assessment. Instead, her education was not interrupted and she is happily attending every day.

In addition to responding to over 350 individual requests for help for school children, the Foundation:

- provided over 1,000 school supply-filled backpacks to several high-poverty communities and school districts before the new school year started.
- partnered with organizations whose sole mission is to get reading books into the hands of children all over North Carolina.
- · supported clothing closets that were experiencing supply shortages.
- · partnered with organizations that provide for school children in foster care.
- partnered with food banks to provide food to allow school employees to access food for students.

Students helped by the North Carolina Foundation for Public School Children experience life transformations and are given hope, opportunity, and success. Once in a while, a child's life is saved.



NC Teacher Cadet

Christa McAuliffe said, "I touch the future; I teach." The Foundation is touching the future by providing a pathway into the profession for bright high school students who want to shape the future as dedicated teachers

The NC Teacher Cadet program has grown and is having a positive effect on the teaching profession in our state. The program has become the major teacher recruitment program in North Carolina. Some colleges are giving academic credit to our Teacher Cadets. School systems are offering employment contracts to our Teacher Cadets upon their high school graduation. We are proud to announce that the Teacher Cadet program is now the state affiliate for Educators Rising, a national program of Phi Delta Kappa.

The 2025 Teacher Cadet State Conference brought together 350 high school students from across the state, students who are in Teacher Cadet classes and Future Teachers of America clubs. These students are seriously considering a future career in teaching so they gathered for two days to network, hear from inspirational educators, and participate in breakout sessions designed to give them information about what to expect as teachers. They also had time to eat, dance, and sing. This year's conference was planned and led by the 2024-2025 Teacher Cadet state officers who chose as their theme "Be the Light through Leadership."

Scholarships For Future Teachers

The North Carolina Foundation for Public School Children is proud to support young people on their journey to become a teacher through our Scholarships for Future Teachers.

The Jane Hansel Teacher Cadet Scholarship, named after the program's first state coordinator, awards \$1,000 to high school senior Teacher Cadets.

In partnership with the North Carolina Association of Educators, the Mary Morrow-Edna Richards Scholarships awards \$2,500 to future teachers. The scholarship is named in memory of Mary Frank Morrow who served as the first president of the North Carolina Classroom Teachers Association, and Edna Cotton Richards, an outstanding leader in the North Carolina Teachers Association and the North Carolina Association of Educators. The scholarship is open annually to high school seniors and college juniors pursuing degrees in teaching.

Disaster Relief

September 27, 2024. That date will be in the minds of North Carolinians for a long time, the day Hurricane Helene devastated Western North Carolina.



So many families lost everything. Among those were school children and educators. The needs were tremendous. When the time came for schools to reopen, children and educators needed clothing, shoes, school supplies, and help with transportation. This Foundation quickly aided students and school employees with financial assistance so they could go back to school with what they needed and so that learning could continue.

When you enter a classroom, much of what you see - the classroom library of books, cozy reading areas, items to create a beautiful, colorful, inviting atmosphere for students - has been purchased through the years from the teacher's own pockets. In Western North Carolina, teachers saw their carefully built classroom inventories destroyed, gone in one day. Through this Foundation's disaster relief grants, we were able to send funds quickly so teachers could replace what was destroyed.

In addition to supporting individual teachers, the Foundation sent grants to schools that had been totally displaced. Those funds were for schools to use for the needs they determined were greatest.

We are here for our children and public schools in Western North Carolina and beyond. When our professionals experience a flood, a tornado, or a fire, the Foundation will be there to help for as long as they need us.

When Hurricane Helene' devastated Western North Carolina, the Foundation immediately shared about our Disaster Relief program for students, schools, and teachers. Word spread - not only in North Carolina - but around the country.



JOSH STEIN

Governor Josh Stein was called to public service by his faith and his family. His faith teaches him that we are all called to make a difference. His parents Adam and Jane, raised his brother Eric, sister Gerda, and him to try to do what is right. They grounded him in our shared values of freedom and opportunity for everyone.

As Governor, Stein's focus will be on creating a safer, stronger North Carolina. He will bring people together to help western North Carolina recover from Hurricane Helene, create economic opportunity for all North Carolinians, invest in public schools, and keep people safe.

Stein spent the past eight years serving as North Carolina's Attorney General. During that time, he and his team worked to clear the nation's largest backlog of untested rape kits and hold accountable the big drug companies that created and fueled the opioid crisis, securing more than \$50 billion in settlement funds, including nearly \$1.5 billion for North Carolina to help people struggling with addiction. They held e-cigarette manufacturer Juul accountable for sparking a teen vaping epidemic – the first state in the country to do so – and protected vulnerable North Carolinians from fraudsters and scammers, including going after companies that price gouged customers in the wake of natural disasters. Stein advocated for fully funding North Carolina's public schools through the Leandro Plan and defended people's right to vote and women's right to choose.

Before his time as Attorney General, Stein served in the state Senate and was a champion for public education, clean energy, and public safety. Between 2001 and 2008, he served as senior deputy attorney general for consumer protection in the North Carolina Department of Justice, where he helped run the payday lenders charging loan shark interest rates out of the state and helped enhance people's privacy protections.

Stein earned law and public policy degrees from Harvard University and graduated from Dartmouth College and Chapel Hill High School. After college, he taught high school English and economics in Zimbabwe for two years. As a young lawyer, Stein worked with the Self-Help Credit Union to develop affordable single-family homes in Durham and with the North Carolina Minority Support Center to raise capital to invest in small businesses across North Carolina. Josh and his wife, Anna, live in Raleigh and are members of Temple Beth Or. They are the proud parents of Sam, Adam, and Leah, who all attended North Carolina public schools, just like they did.

Replacements, Ltd. Founder, Chairman, Director & CEO Bob Page was born in Reidsville, North Carolina and lives in Greensboro, North Carolina. He is a dedicated community member and works, with others, to make it better.

Bob remains true to his roots. He grew up on his family's small tobacco farm in Ruffin, North Carolina, where he helped by working alongside his family in the field. Bob's late father taught him the importance of helping his neighbors and sharing what little they had. After graduating from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Bob served in the United States Army, leaving active duty in 1970.

A Certified Public Accountant, Bob spent the 1970s hating his job as a state auditor. As he says, he lived for his weekend hobby of searching for china and crystal at flea markets. Longing to make a living doing what he loved, Bob ignored naysayers and quit his job. When Bob founded Replacements, Ltd. in 1981, he never envisioned that a business begun as a part-time hobby in his attic would grow into a multimillion-dollar enterprise. Today, Replacements stands as the world's largest retailer of vintage and new tableware, collectibles, and estate jewelry. In 2024, Bob's long-held passion for the thrill of the hunt, coupled with his appreciation for giving cherished items new life, led to the creation of a new category inclusive of antiquities, art, and other curated treasures. A privately held company, Replacements offers more than 475,000 tableware patterns and has served millions of customers across 6 continents from warehouse space larger than 8 football fields.

The importance of family and fairness are core values for Bob. Bob says that nothing matters more than his young adult sons, Owen and Ryan, twins adopted as infants in Vietnam. Because of Bob's pain experiencing anti-gay discrimination, Replacements has been shaped by Bob's philosophy of creating a merit-based workplace in which all people are free to bring their talents and energy to their work.

Additionally, Replacements seeks to reflect the wide diversity of the community. As a result, Replacements has employed over 100 former refugees and boasts of employing people from 46 other countries who, among them, speak 21 native languages. While the Replacements workplace of over 350 individuals is too diverse to summarize neatly, it represents a rich array of ethnicities, cultures, backgrounds, and experiences.

Bob and Replacements give generously, and Bob supports the community with financial resources, time, goods, and volunteers. Bob believes passionately in fostering an open society and promoting human dignity. Bob works to make positive changes in the community, champion equality, expand civil rights, and advance progressive policies.

Bob directs financial contributions toward a large variety of local, statewide, and national organizations and institutions. He is especially involved in Bob's Closet, a charitable clothing program on-site at Replacements that provides clothing and other household items to low-income persons and communities at no cost. Annually, Bob's Closet

serves thousands and shares more than 60,000 items in total.

Bob is honored to have received North Carolina A & T State University's Human Rights Medal, the National Conference for Community and Justice Brotherhood/Sisterhood Citation Award, Children of Vietnam's Ben Wilson Humanitarian Award, and the Latino Community Coalition's Corazón Latino, among other community recognition. In September 2021, Governor Roy Cooper presented Bob with the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the highest honor given by the Governor for exemplary service.

As Chairperson and Owner of North Carolina Football Club, Steve Malik has been a pivotal force in transforming soccer in North Carolina, particularly through the incredible work of the North Carolina Courage. Since joining the club in 2015, Steve has championed initiatives that not only elevate the sport but also empower youth, especially young girls, to dream big and pursue their passions.

Inspiring Young Girls & Beyond

Under Steve's leadership, the Courage has become a beacon of success, winning back-to-back NWSL titles in 2018 and 2019. But Steve's impact goes beyond soccer wins - he is committed to fostering a culture of inspiration, support, and leadership for young athletes, especially girls. The Courage's dedication to mentorship, role modeling, and accessibility is evident in their partnerships with local youth programs.

NCFC Youth Collaboration

The Courage's collaboration with North Carolina FC Youth is a testament to their dedication to community engagement. Through this partnership, every NCFC Youth player receives a free season ticket, discounted family tickets, and access to special youth sections at matches, ensuring that families feel welcomed and supported. The program is designed to give young athletes the opportunity to see athletes at the highest level that they can aspire to be while growing within the sport and soccer community.

STEM Education through Soccer

The Courage's commitment to making a difference also extends to education. In partnership with Lenovo, The Courage runs the Starting STEM program, a curriculum that merges soccer with STEM learning. Through hands-on activities, workshops, and interactive STEM Field Days, the program helps elementary and middle school students develop a greater appreciation for science, technology, engineering, and math—while seeing how soccer can inspire problem-solving and teamwork.

Bringing Joy to Children Facing Medical Challenges

Another key initiative is The Courage's partnership with A Kid Again, an organization that creates joy-filled adventures for children battling life-threatening conditions. Through this partnership, families are welcomed to Courage matches for a special game day experience, complete with private training sessions with Courage players. This initiative gives families a much-needed respite and creates unforgettable memories for these brave children.

A Legacy of Giving Back

Steve Malik's leadership extends far beyond the soccer field, with a strong focus on creating meaningful experiences that positively impact the lives of young athletes and children in need. Through initiatives that promote inclusivity, education, and joy, Steve and the North Carolina Courage continue to make a lasting difference in the lives of children and teens, fostering a future where every young person feels inspired to reach their full potential. These initiatives are at the heart of who The Courage is; ensuring soccer is more than just a game but a force for good in our community.



BOOK HARVEST GINGER YOUNG



Book Harvest works to realize a world of literacy and justice for all—a world in which every child grows up with an abundant home library from birth and with a love of books, reading, and learning, and every parent feels supported, celebrated, and affirmed in their role as their child's first teacher. Since 2011, children have harvested more than 2.5 million books to build their home libraries, ensuring that parents have the tools and power to ignite and strengthen their children's literacy. With programs grounded in evidence, Book Harvest believes that literacy starts at birth, in the home, powered by parents, and nourished with books.

Book Harvest's story began in 2011. The setting was Ginger Young's garage filled with donated books, and the cast of characters was small - just a handful of quirky dreamers eager to unlock book ownership and a love of a good story for children in Durham, North Carolina.

From those humble origins, Book Harvest's story has been written with great momentum. From a grassroots effort fueled by volunteers, to an ever-growing team of 19 professionals; from a handful of book provision events throughout the community, to hundreds of bookshelves brimming with books in homes, classrooms, and doctors' offices, on street corners, at bus stations, and in laundromats; and from a few boxes of donated books in a garage, to more than 1.6 million books harvested by children and families – books they have taken home to read again and again, theirs to keep forever.

In 2021, Book Harvest concluded their first decade with a rich and effective portfolio of programs dedicated to transforming children's literacy.

In their home community of Durham, they have forged an ecosystem of robust and resilient children's literacy, fueled by their dream of books for every child and support for every parent, starting at birth, and by a passion for helping every community build a culture of childhood literacy.

In 2022, they began laying the groundwork to expand Book Harvest – and its impact – beyond their flagship community of Durham, NC.

Book Harvest is doing the hard, essential work to transform children's literacy across the state of North Carolina and beyond. Less than half of all U.S. children who live in poverty enter kindergarten ready to learn, yet book ownership is not within reach of every child. Book Harvest enters its second decade with three shimmering – and achievable – dreams:

- 1. Books for every child.
- 2. Support for every parent.
- 3. Literacy for every community.

Ginger Young recognizes every child's innate brilliance and boundless potential. Through Book Harvest, she works alongside parents to unlock opportunities for their precious children and to ensure that every child everywhere has what they need to thrive in school and in life.



EPWORTH UMC REVEREND DONNA BANKS



Epworth United Methodist Church declares itself a Reconciling Congregation, seeking to welcome all persons, regardless of age, race, ethnicities, disabilities, gender, gender identity or sexual orientation, into the discipleship of Christian living and proclaim our commitment to seek the reconciliation of all persons to God and to each other through Jesus Christ.

The first worship service for Epworth Church was on February 3, 1952, at the Hope Valley Elementary School. Today, the body of Epworth United Methodist Church is known for their outreach ministry to their community and beyond - and, especially to school children living in poverty. Their outreach model embraces their local schools to discover ways that they can help children lead a healthier and full life.

Epworth has partnered with other churches and organizations to create a strong after-school tutoring program each Monday and Wednesday during the normal Durham, NC School year. The program focuses on at-risk third, fourth and fifth graders. Part of the program is aimed at helping children with reading, writing, spelling, comprehension and math skills as well as general homework help. A more focused element of the program involves tutors who have voluntarily received training, paid for by Epworth, through the Augustine Literacy Project, that is designed to help students with a wide range of reading disabilities or problems.

Epworth United Methodist Church answers the call to help a growing number of children who are chronically undernourished. Many children rely on school lunches for their main meal of the day but go without an adequate meal on the weekends. Through their Backpack Ministries, Epworth delivers packs of nutritious food to their local elementary school to be distributed to kids who have been identified as needing them.

For over 23 years, Epworth has been a part of "Families Moving Forward," a ministry that helps families move from temporary homelessness to stable housing and provides support during this transformation. They also support feeding homeless individuals through Durham Urban Ministries by serving meals several times each year to over 150 people.

Rev. Donna Banks is the senior pastor of Epworth United Methodist Church. Upon graduation from Duke Divinity School, she joined the staff as the Associate Pastor of Christ United Methodist Church in Chapel Hill. She also served appointments as the senior pastor at Saint Francis United Methodist Church in Cary, NC and Evergreen United Methodist Church in Chapel Hill, NC, as well as District Superintendent for the Corridor District of the North Carolina Conference and Director of Student Life at Duke Divinity School. Prior to her call to ministry, Donna has previous experience from her 16-year career in the chemical industry, which afforded her the opportunity to have a succession of roles as a research chemist and in corporate sales, marketing and management. Donna is married with two daughters.

Remembering our Great Champions for Children



Dean DebnamMay 22, 1954 - September 12, 2024

Dean believed that to share more is to create more. He bridged the gaps he saw around him, small and large. A generous man, he opened his home to countless people, whether they were blood-relatives or not, and welcomed them into the family all the same. Dean would protect and uplift his people any way he could.

The only stingy thing about Dean was his patience. He moved as fast as he could and expected folks to keep up, whether walking down a street or running down an idea. He was knowledgeable, and he loved long thought-provoking conversations (or debates, depending on the subject matter). Dean had an incredible knack for diving into the depths of people's mind and motivations. He instilled that love of discussion in many of his kids. The people whose lives he touched will continue to find motivation in his example.



Sarah Jordan May 26, 1934 - November 24, 2024

Sarah Cole Jordan spent her life and career as an educator, a dedicated community service volunteer through church and all phases of local and state youth ministry, conference youth events, Scouts, and youth camps. She was personally dedicated to advocating for our state's youngest and most vulnerable children and families. After graduating from Woman's College with a degree in elementary education, she worked in the North Carolina Public Schools and as an advocate for children and higher education in the state. She served on the Board of Trustees at Louisburg College, the Board of Visitors for Bennett College, and the Board of Visitors for the Duke University Divinity School. She also served as a Director of the NC Child Advocacy Institute, a Director of Friends of the Library of NCSU as well on the board of the NC Methodist Home for Children for over three decades.



Willie T. Ramey III March 24, 1945 - June 8, 2024

Rev. Dr. Ramey led a life of service. He was a teacher, a principal, a minister, and a mentor to many young people. He served as President of North Carolina Retired School Personnel and Chairperson of the NCRSP Administrative Council and Executive Board, and he served NCRSP in numerous other state-level roles as well. Additionally, he was a member of the North Carolina Association of Educators Board of Directors and a life member of the National Education Association (NEA). He was appointed by Governor Cooper as a Trustee of the Vance-Granville Community College. Trustee Ramey was a Charter member Rho Beta Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., serving as its president for 16 years. He served as senior pastor for the Ridgeway Missionary Baptist Church for 46 years. He championed education for all.



A Remembrance to our Beloved Dean Debnam

"Dean lived an extraordinary life, touching and helping thousands, even without their knowledge. This past May Governor Cooper awarded him the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, given for extraordinary service to North Carolina. Among a variety of business and community involvements, Dean was most recently former CEO and owner of Workplace Options, an international human services employee assistance company with locations in 195 countries, founder and president of Public Policy Polling, and founder and president of Debnam Commercial Real Estate.

Dean was a man of immense drive and will. He was unafraid to take risks personally or professionally. A creative, generative thinker, he launched hundreds of projects and empowered people around him to carry them forward. He was a catalyst, giving people the fuel, the responsibilities, or the opportunities to go further and do more than they had imagined for themselves.

Dean's commitment to the people of his city and state was deeply felt and drove his decades-long involvement in progressive causes and Democratic politics.
